What is wisdom? Wisdom is defined by Webster's Dictionary as the quality of having experience, knowledge, and good judgment; the quality of being wise. It can also be defined as sanctified common sense.

How would you like to learn from the wisest man who ever lived? Solomon predominantly wrote Proverbs giving practical insights and guidelines for life. These short, pithy sayings draw from the everyday life of people. Proverbs covers a wide range of topics from how to have friends; how to resolve conflict; how to handle money; the value of hard work; what to do with an annoying spouse; not to overeat, the list is endless.

Proverbs are actually poems usually in couplet form (two lines) written with figurative, poetic language which helps us to paint a picture in our minds. Proverbs also are laced with synonyms (same words), antonyms (opposite words), analogies and similes.

The word "proverb" comes from the Hebrew word that means "to rule or to govern" and can be used to govern our lives with these helpful and true sayings. So, if you want to read the GREATEST self-help book in the world, read Proverbs and read on for a fun challenging word game too.

ONE A DAY

Remember those commercials for One A Day Vitamins? How about One A Day Proverbs! There are 31 Proverbs in the Bible - one for each day of the month! How conveniently our Lord arranged that. Read one Proverb each day for a month. Then repeat the process each month.

Stop when one verse jumps out at you and discuss further together:

- Have you found this true in your life?
- Why did this verse "speak" to you?
- What is your takeaway what did you learn?
- Will you do anything differently next time in life?

FUN CHALLENGING WORD GAME - SAME, OPPOSITE, OR ADDS TO THE IDEA OF THE FIRST LINE?

In addition to the heaps of practical knowledge you will gain from reading Proverbs, here's a fun challenging word game using these pearls of wisdom.

Proverbs are written with two lines to reinforce an idea. In other words, to drive home a point using the second line in various ways. Sometimes, the second line is used to either say:

- The SAME thing again using a different word (a synonym or simile)
- The OPPOSITE thing with another word (an antonym)
- Or it ADDS TO THE IDEA OF THE FIRST LINE



A synonym is a word or phrase that means exactly or nearly the same as another word or phrase, For example: shut is a synonym of close. A simile compares two things using the words "like" or "as". For example: "She was as angry as a bull!"

Here are some examples:

PROVERBS 10:12

12 Hatred stirs up quarrels, but love covers all offenses.

PROVERBS 16:18

18 Pride goes before destruction, and haughtiness before a fall. SAME, OPPOSITE, OR ADDS TO THE IDEA OF THE FIRST LINE? ANSWER: SAME

Below are some of the top Proverbs where the "game words" and answers are highlighted. It is suggested the caregiver:

- Reads the Proverb
- Repeats the two "game words"
- Then ask if the two "game words" are SAME, OPPOSITE OR ADDS TO THE IDEA OF THE FIRST LINE?

PROVERBS 9:10

10 The fear of the LORD is the beginning of wisdom, and knowledge of the Holy One is understanding.

ANSWER: SAME

PROVERBS 12:15

15 The way of fools seems right to them, but the wise listen to advice.

ANSWER: OPPOSITE

PROVERBS 12:18

18 The words of the reckless pierce like swords, but the tongue of the wise brings healing.

ANSWER: OPPOSITE

PROVERBS 13:10

10 Where there is strife, there is pride, but wisdom is found in those who take advice.

ANSWER: ADDS TO THE IDEA OF THE FIRST LINE

PROVERBS 13:24

24 Whoever spares the rod hates their children, but the one who loves their children is careful to discipline them.

ANSWER: OPPOSITE



PROVERBS 14:12

12 There is a way that appears to be right, but in the end it leads to death.

15 A gentle answer turns away wrath, but a harsh word stirs up anger.
